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NORWAY - UNITED AGAINST HIV AND AIDS

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INTRODUCTION

People living with HIV all over the world have the right to a life in dignity, free from stigma and discrimination, Responding to HIV means inclusion, opportunity, empowerment, protection and access to quality services. Norway is an active partner in the HIV response, both nationally and internationally - standing by the commitment made in the UN to secure Universal Access to HIV prevention, treatment, care and support.

The "Health in All Policies" approach is needed at the global, national, regional and local levels

To secure Universal Access to HIV prevention, treatment, care and support we need to maximize positive synergies between HIV policies, health policies and broader social, development and human rights policies, while at the same time keeping the



focus on what is specific to HIV/AIDS. All countries should be encouraged to develop a public health policy based on the idea "health in all policies". Norway's approach reflects this and the national HIV strategy is a collaboration between six ministries. Globally we work for an integrated approach and our three main priorities are mobilising for women's and children's right and health, reduce the burden of disease and promoting human security through health. Reponses to HIV need to address particularly those groups who are at most risk, while also securing an adequate level of knowledge in the whole population.

Primary Health Care is a key

National health systems must be strengthened, particularly primary health care. Norwegian efforts to integrate health in foreign and development policy are particularly directed towards child and maternal health care and prevention and treatment of HIV, malaria and tuberculosis, HIV needs to be integrated in primary health care as much as possible, while work in social sectors more broadly is needed to create sustainable systems and rights based services. Norway has had more resources than many to build a national health care system. While the treatment of HIV is generally well taken care of for all in need, persons living with HIV face a number of obstacles due to stigma and misconceptions, from health personnel as well as from employers and others.

Law raises complex issues concerning equality, fairness, and justice

The work to change entry restrictions for people living with HIV is an example of how advocacy can work to change laws. Selecting Washington as the venue of the AIDS 2012 conference underlines how society can shape laws, and how laws shape society. The Norwegian Government has appointed a Law Commission on Penal Code and Communicable Diseases to assess a number of topics related to criminalisation of transmission of communicable diseases, including HIV. The Commission will submit its report to the Ministry of Health in October 2012. The issue of law and HIV raises questions linked to medical practice, social science, justice and ethics.

The slogan for this conference signifies hope. Combined with new knowledge - and lessons learnt shared during the conference - we can all strengthen our work to turning the tide together.

ACCEPTANCE AND COPING NORWAY'S NATIONAL HIV STRATEGY (2009-2014)

The comprehensive aim of the National HIV Strategy (2009-2014) is that by the end of the strategy period, Norway will be a society that accepts and copes with HIV in a way that both limits new infections and gives persons living with HIV good conditions for social inclusion in all phases of their lives.

The aim is twofold with one focus on prevention of new infections and another on living conditions for PLHIV. Although no effort must be spared to ensure that as few people as possible are infected with HIV, we must recognise that tens of millions of people in the world are living with HIV. To ensure that more of PLHIV in Norway experience that they have good living conditions is in itself a crucial preventive strategy for avoiding the spread of HIV.

In addition to the main aim, the strategy has two operative general objectives and eight specific objectives. Under each of the specific objectives, a number of strategic moves are listed.

General objectives:

- New infections with HIV shall be reduced especially in groups with high vulnerability to HIV.
- II. Everyone living with HIV shall be ensured good treatment and follow-up regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation and/or practice, domicile, ethnic background and personal finances.

Specific objectives:

- 1) Increase the knowledge about and awareness of HIV and AIDS in the population.
- 2) Reduce stigmatisation and discrimination associated with HIV.
- 3) Reduce new infections especially among at-risk groups.
- Reduce hidden sources of error early detection of HIV infection; testing, surveys, diagnostics and appropriate counselling.
- Remove barriers to access to medical treatment and comprehensive treatment programmes based on good teamwork among the health service providers involved.

- 6) Ensure the participation of HIV positive persons in the labour force.
- Further promote international cooperation and efforts, and follow up international obligations in the efforts to combat HIV and AIDS.
- 8) Help improve research on the prevention and treatment of HIV as well as monitoring and evaluation of prevalence, risk factors and effects of measures.

Objectives and strategies in "Acceptance and Coping" involve stakeholders at all administrative levels and many sectors of society. Six ministries and their underlying agencies, including the regional and local levels, play a role in the follow-up of the strategy. These are: Ministry of Labour and Social Inclusion, Ministry of Children and Equality, Ministry of Health and Care Services, Ministry of Justice and the Police, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

The Ministry of Health and Care Services has the overall responsibility for coordinating the interministerial work, while the Directorate of Health heads the coordinating group at Directorate level.

Civil society and NGOs are also key implementing agents. Involvement of persons living with HIV is a crucial success factor in the implementation of the plan.

GLOBAL HEALTH IN FOREIGN AND DEVELOPMENT POLICY

Report to the Storting (white paper) Meld. St. 11(2011-2012)

Norway is actively engaged in global AIDS diplomacy to develop an effective global response. The Government channels its HIV efforts through multilateral partners as well as through NGOs and bilateral aid. The white paper states the following priorities:

- Contribute to efforts to combat HIV globally
- Strengthen efforts and research related to communicable diseases in developing countries, with an emphasis on building capacity and competence. This includes strengthening the capacity of national health systems to carry out preventive work
- Further develop broad partnerships between multilateral organisations, national institutions, the private sector and civil society to combat communicable diseases. This includes organisations of those affected by these diseases, and crosssector efforts, with particular focus on the link between HIV and tuberculosis
- Help to improve living conditions and quality of life for HIVpositive persons, and to normalising their status in society
- Continue to give priority to HIV/AIDS efforts with an emphasis on the rights perspective and the prevention and elimination of mother-to-child transmission
- Promote the rights of vulnerable groups, including the decriminalisation of homosexuality, highlight the links between sexual and reproductive rights and HIV infection, and encourage national health systems to give due emphasis to HIV infection among injecting drug users
- Seek to foster greater acceptance in the international community of the need for and the benefits of sex education for young people as a preventive measure against the spread of HIV/AIDS

NORWEGIAN NATIONAL HIV AND AIDS COUNCIL

In order to help facilitate the coordination of the national measures with the international AIDS policy, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Ministry of Health and Care Services appointed a joint Norwegian National HIV and AIDS Council in 2007.

The Council meets two times a year and is chaired alternately by a Minister or State Secretary from MHCS or MFA respectively. The Council has members from affected government agencies and from civil society, including representatives for people living with HIV and from organisations that work on international development cooperation and with youth.

The Council is a platform for discussing key topics and challenges related to the epidemic abroad and at home, as well as a platform for a dialogue with the political leadership in both ministries. The council has no decision-making authority.

The yearly number of newly diagnosed HIV positive persons in Norway doubled from about 150 cases in the 1990s to nearly 270 cases in 2011 (Norway's population is around 5 million). This is primarily due to an increase in the number of HIV positive immigrants who have come to Norway from countries with a high prevalence of HIV, and to an increase in HIV infection among MSM in Norway the last six years. In the last ten years, no definite increase in heterosexual HIV infection among persons born in Norway has been confirmed.

Among IDUs, the number of HIV-infected persons has remained at a stable low level. The number of confirmed HIV infections among heterosexual youth remains low. Only one case of infection through blood transfusion has been confirmed in Norway after 1986 and this case has been tracked abroad. HIV infection in children in connection with pregnancy and birth has not occurred in Norway since 1999.

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CENTRE FOR INTERNATIONAL HEALTH (CIH)

Global perspectives on health

From the establishment at UiB in 1988 until today, CIH has developed from a small research centre to a leading institution in the field of international health. The Centre aims to provide high quality research with relevance for and impact on health policy. Equally important is the aim to strengthen research capacity at partner institutions in low and middle income countries. CIH is organized in thematic research groups; Child Health and Nutrition, Global Health and HIV/AIDS and some smaller groups.

Innovative research on HIV

HIV, a massive global challenge, demands a wide range of actions both to prevent new cases of HIV, but also to relieve sufferings through treatment and support. The HIV/AIDS research group studies a wide array of topics, e.g. HIV epidemiology to better understand dynamics and trends in transmission; finding more acceptable ways of HIV testing and counseling, finding ways of appropriate and more effective task sharing within health systems and sexual risk taking. All research projects are conducted in close cooperation with partner institutions in Africa and Asia and closely linked with local capacity strengthening.

The research targets the needs of the population, and research findings are put to use in both policy changes and actual medical treatment schemes.

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CHANGEMAKER

Changemaker is an international non-governmental youth movement. We are at the moment 2000 young people between the ages of 13 and 30 in Norway. We aim to attack the fundamental causes of the unequal distribution of resources between rich northern countries and the poor South. One of our mottos is that knowledge without action is cowardice, but action without knowledge is stupidity.

We focus on the connections within the North-South relationship, which are extremely complex. We must seek out knowledge in order to know where to make changes. Awareness raising among young people is important.

Changemaker is working on five topics: climate change, international trade relations, global health, peace and developing country debt. Through Norwegian politics, we try to set the agenda to make a change on these themes.

On global health and HIV/AIDS, we are working on access to medicines for the world's poor. WTO's patent legislation, the TRIPS agreement, is making medicines unavailable to the ones who need it the most. Diseases that don't affect the rich North, are also neglected in the drug industry, making big health challenges in the South hard to meet. The fact that many rich countries also depend on recruiting health personnel from poorer countries, is draining the health sector in the South. These are some examples on what we are focusing on.

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GAY AND LESBIAN HEALTH NORWAY

Gay and Lesbian Health Norway is an independent and countrywide NGO serving the LGBT-community. The organization focuses on disease prevention for women who have sex with women and men who have sex with men (MSM). HIV is the highest priority area within the organization's professional portfolio.

Our goal is to make life healthier for our target groups, both physically and mentally. To meet these goals, our programs are grounded in evidence both from social science research as well as stringent evaluations.

Sexual minorities in Norway have roughly the same level of health as the population as a whole. However, in some key areas LGBT-people are overrepresented, for example when it comes to HIV and AIDS.

HIV and risky sexual behavior among MSM is often a symptom of lifestyle, shame, stigma, a lack of knowledge and/or minority stress.

Therefore Gay and Lesbian Health Norway believes that providing knowledge about all health issues experienced by gay men, both mentally and physically, is a form of HIV prevention.

Gay and Lesbian Health Norway has released a general health brochure for all men who have sex with men that covers a wide range of health issues, with the aim to improve the collective and personal health of all men who have sex with men in Norway.

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NORWEGIAN CHURCH AID (NCA)

Norwegian Church Aid is a voluntary, ecumenical organisation that works to promote the basic rights of human beings.

Norwegian Church Aid has been involved in HIV-related work for more than 20 years.

In the new Global Strategy for 2011-2015, Norwegian Church Aid has defined 12 global programs. Among them is: Social mitigation of HIV and AIDS

The goal of the program is: improved quality of life for people living with or affected by HIV and AIDS. This will be achieved by providing legal, social, economic and spiritual support particularly to women and children orphaned by or living with HIV and AIDS. We will provide life skills training for youth living with HIV. We will mobilise civil society to advocate for the right to access to treatment and care as well as advocate for strong, efficient and accountable public services.

The program will be implemented through our local partners in 10 countries in Africa, Asia and Europe. Our main partners are faith-based organisations.

The Norwegian HIV Patient Network is a newly established network for all people living with HIV (PLHIV) in Norway. We have a wider health focus and our aim is to ensure that all patients with HIV get the best possible treatment and care, regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, ethnicity and where we live. Our method is to encourage and empower fellow PLHIV to establish local patient networks/groups throughout the country.

To cooperate with professionals, administrative and political representatives at all levels of health care and social system is essential in order to establish and maintain such patient networks and to ensure the best possible treatment and care both locally and nationally, based on increased patient participation. We have currently established a patient network in Oslo and will work towards recruiting representatives/groups and forming networks in all major cities during 2012/13.

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PRIMARY HEALTH WORKSHOP - CENTRE FOR HEALTH, DIALOGUE AND DEVELOPMENT

PMV promotes activities, learning and health work in a multicultural setting. It is a centre where public and private organisations can obtain information and advice with regards to multicultural issues and challenges. PMV is owned and partially financed by the Church City Mission of Oslo, the Municipality of Oslo and the Directorate of integration and diversity (IMDI).

The people who visit the centre on a regular basis are primarily immigrant women (many of whom are isolated in society), children and youth who need a "meeting place".

PMV believes that playing an active part in decision-making helps people realise their inherent strengths as well as motivates them to take control of their own lives and health. Strategies are - self help groups, interreligious dialogue, theatre for development. An overarching principle is empowerment.

The project on HIV and AIDS is linked to projects about forced marriage and female genital mutilation, i.e. overlapping activities, and to some degree the encouragement of synergies and exchange of experience between the participants.

- Developing methods and strategies for information work with emphasis on facts and statistics, treatment options and prevention among immigrant youth, especially boys.

- Newborns, children and young people must be protected from HIV-infection

Globally, more than 2.1 million children are now living with HIV. 15 million children have lost one or both parents to AIDS, 12 million of these live in Africa, 50% of new infections occur among adolescents and young people, with girls being disproportionally affected. Every day more than 1000 babies are born HIV positive. most will die before the age of five. Millions are acting as caregivers to younger siblings and sick parents.
