### Evaluation Programme 2020–2022

Evaluation is an important instrument for an effective development policy. While different parts of the Norwegian development aid administration are responsible for reporting the results of individual aid interventions, the Evaluation Department has a particular responsibility for documenting the degree to which Norwegian development assistance is effective, relevant, and achieves the expected results.

The department is governed under a separate mandate and reports directly to the Secretaries General of the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Norwegian Ministry of Climate and Environment. The work of the department is carried out according to the principles described below.

#### Evaluations shall:

- be conducted independently of those who are responsible for the administration and implementation of programmes and projects;
- be conducted in accordance with recognised professional evaluation methods and principles;
- seek to elucidate relevant issues;
- put forward operational recommendations that may be utilised in the preparation of budgets and in further development of the activity being evaluated;
- contribute to a constructive and open debate.

### About the programme

Independence, credibility and usability are fundamental principles for evaluation work. To ensure independence and credibility, the work will be undertaken in accordance with recognised criteria and standards for higquality evaluation practice. To ensure that the evaluations will be relevant and useful, the programme has been designed in consultation with actors both inside and outside the aid administration, with an intention to identify knowledge and issues that will be relevant for the Norwegian development cooperation going forward. At the different stages of the evaluation processes, provisions are made for good interaction and dialogue with stakeholders.

In this period, the evaluation programme maintains a particular focus on private sector development, climate and environment, humanitarian assistance and assistance to fragile states and regions.

Six evaluations and eight studies are planned to be completed and presented during 2020.

## Private sector development

Development of and cooperation with the private sector is a key element in Norwegian development policy. Support to private sector development should help create jobs and provide wages to individuals and tax revenues to governments, as well as generate inclusive and sustainable economic growth. In these efforts, special challenges are associated with documentation of additionality and development effects.

### Study: Clarification of concepts related to blended finance

Mapping study of concepts related to 'blended finance'. The study is included in an effort undertaken by the Evaluation Department in collaboration with the evaluation network in OECD/DAC, which includes evaluation offices in a number of OECD countries and multilateral organisations.

(Ongoing, completion planned 2nd quarter 2020)

## Evaluation of selected programmes in the Knowledge Bank: Support to the fisheries sector in Africa

Norway has supported the fisheries sector in various countries in Africa for several decades. Since 2016, this support has been administered by 'Fish for Development', one of the programmes in the Knowledge Bank in Norad. The evaluation will examine the effect of this effort in selected areas, especially marine resources management and regional collaboration, which may provide input to the work on further developing Norwegian support to this area.

(Planned start-up in 2020)

#### Evaluation of instruments for mixed funding

This evaluation will examine instruments that can be used to mobilise commercial capital to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals, both to assess whether these instruments are suitable and to determine whether appropriate instruments are being applied. The evaluation will seek to provide input to further development of Norwegian efforts in this area. (Planned start-up in 2021)

# Humanitarian assistance and support to fragile states and regions

Humanitarian assistance is a prioritised area in Norwegian development policy, with a total budget of more than NOK 5.5 billion. In addition, large amounts are devoted to long-term development efforts in fragile states and regions. Key issues in this area include whether Norway is delivering on the goals and commitments that have been defined for its humanitarian efforts and whether these efforts are sufficiently rights-based.

### Evaluations of Norwegian interventions in selected countries

The evaluations will assess the overall Norwegian assistance in selected countries. The country evaluations will – depending on country and context – assess issues relating to coordination of humanitarian and long-term assistance; involvement of local partners; organisation, planning and management of Norwegian development cooperation; involvement of those affected by crises; the rights-based orientation of assistance; and use of innovative instruments. These evaluations may provide input to ongoing interventions in fragile states and to the development of country strategies.

Initially, an evaluation has been undertaken of the Norwegian efforts in *South Sudan* in the period 2011–2018, while an evaluation of the Norwegian efforts in *Somalia* in the years 2012–2018 is ongoing. A third country evaluation is planned to start later in the programme period. (*Ongoing*)

## Evaluation of Norwegian support for an integrated response to refugees and internally displaced people in the Syrian region

The evaluation will examine the Norwegian support to refugees and internally displaced people in Syria and its neighbouring countries, including the relationship between humanitarian efforts and long-term assistance. (*Planned start-up in 2020*)

### Evaluation of Norwegian efforts for women, peace and security

Norway has been a driving force internationally to advance the agenda of women, peace and security. The evaluation will map and analyse the efforts to ensure that women's participation, influence, rights and needs are safeguarded as part of peace and security work. The evaluation will aim to provide input to the preparation of a new action plan on women, peace and security for the period 2022–2025.

(Planned start-up in 2020)

### Climate and environment

Climate and environment are increasingly important topics in Norwegian aid policy. Climate change and poor management of land and marine environments render people more vulnerable to humanitarian crises and may undermine the efforts to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals. In Norwegian development policy, climate and environment encompass topics such as forest conservation (the Norwegian International Climate and Forest Initiative (NICFI), support for sustainable maritime resource management, climate adaptation and food production. In addition, climate and environment constitute cross-cutting issues that must be included in all development initiatives.

## Evaluation of private sector participation in Norway's International Climate and Forest Initiative (NICFI)

The evaluation maps and analyses the efforts of NICFI to mobilise the private sector. The purpose of the evaluation is to provide new knowledge about how to engage the private sector in the fight against deforestation, and to contribute to NICFI's new strategic programme towards 2030. (Ongoing, completion planned in the 1st quarter of 2021)



## Evaluation of how Norwegian support to private sector development safeguards environmental considerations

Climate and private sector development are prioritised areas for Norwegian development policy. The evaluation will investigate whether climate and environmental considerations are safeguarded in Norwegian support to private sector development.

(Planned start-up in 2021)

### Evaluation of support to civil society by Norway's International Climate and Forest Initiative

Norway's International Climate and Forest Initiative (NICFI) provides support to civil society organisations through a number of different grant agreements that are administered by Norad, the Norwegian embassies and the NICFI-secretariat. The organisations that receive such support range from local indigenous peoples' organisations to international organisations with offices in numerous countries in the Global North as well as the Global South. The evaluation will examine the effects of the support to civil society in light of NICFI's objectives. (Planned start-up in 2021)

### Evaluation of Norwegian aid for renewable energy

Support to renewable energy – hydro, solar and wind power – is an important priority area for Norwegian development assistance. This support pursues multiple objectives, including poverty alleviation, economic growth and reduced greenhouse gas emissions. The evaluation will focus on the latter aspect, and assess the extent to which the programme for renewable energy has helped reduce emissions of greenhouse gases.

### Other evaluations

### Evaluation of the Norwegian aid concentration policy

The purpose of concentration of Norwegian development assistance is to ensure better results. This evaluation will assess how concentration of Norwegian assistance is carried out and examine both the positive and the negative effects of concentration. The evaluation will provide recommendations for the further concentration process.

(Ongoing, completion planned in the 2nd quarter of 2020)

#### Evaluation of Norway's anti-corruption efforts

The evaluation examines Norway's anticorruption efforts over the last decade, both in the form of anti-corruption as a cross-cutting issue in Norwegian development policy as well as more targeted and specific anti-corruption interventions.

(Ongoing, completion planned in the 2nd quarter of 2020)

### Synthesis studies of development evaluations in partner countries

The efforts to systemise existing evaluation knowledge for Norway's partner countries began in 2016. To date, Country Evaluation Briefs have been completed for 12 partner countries. Studies of the remaining five partner countries (Uganda, Ghana, Niger, Indonesia and Colombia) will be launched during the programme period. These studies may be of particular relevance for the work to develop country strategies.

## Study: Assessment of the quality of decentralised evaluations in the Norwegian development aid administration

Over a three-year period, the Evaluation
Department will undertake quality
assessments of the reviews and decentralised
evaluations that have been conducted by the
Norwegian development aid administration.
Annual reports of the compiled assessments
and of the most important knowledge
generated from these evaluations will be
released. These studies will be important in
contributing to the efforts to improve the quality
of the decentralised evaluations.
(Ongoing, annual reports planned in 2020,
2021 and 2022)

## Evaluation of the efforts to include persons with disabilities in Norwegian development assistance

This evaluation will document and assess the efforts to include persons with disabilities in Norwegian development assistance in the period 2012–2020. Inclusion of persons with disabilities is a priority area for development assistance, and a new inclusion strategy is currently in the making. The evaluation aims to provide input to this strategy.

(Planned start-up in 2020)



### Study: Mapping the use of development assistance funds from various ministries

In addition to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Ministry of Climate and Environment, several other ministries administer development assistance funds. This mapping study will identify the ministries that use/administer development assistance funds, the budgets to which the costs are assigned, the purpose of the development assistance and those who are responsible for documenting the development effects of the funds. (Planned start-up in 2021)

#### Evaluation of long-term effects

The evaluation will examine long-term effects of Norwegian development assistance and seek to identify lessons learned with a view to future efforts and initiatives.

## Aid channels and partners

(Planned start-up in 2022)

A large proportion of Norwegian development assistance is channelled through multilateral organisations and funds, as well as civil society organisations.

### Evaluation of the effects of funds at country level

The objective of this evaluation will be to trace effects at country level of selected funds that Norway supports.

(Planned start-up in 2021)

#### OTHER ONGOING ACTIVITIES

### Partnership agreements with evaluation offices in multilateral organisations

The Evaluation Department engages in ongoing technical cooperation with evaluation offices in selected multilateral organisations. The purpose of the cooperation is to help develop evaluation capacity and promote learning. This will be achieved through support for development of technical expertise, collaboration on evaluations and joint dissemination activities. Going forward, this work will concentrate on the independent evaluation units in the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the Global Environment Fund (GEF), the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women (UN Women) and the African Development Bank.

#### Evaluation capacity development

The Evaluation Department collaborates closely with the evaluation networks in OECD/DAC, the development banks and the UN organisations. These efforts include strengthening of the capacity and quality of the evaluation work and peer reviews of the evaluation activities undertaken by these organisations.

### Dissemination of knowledge in relevant thematic areas

In collaboration with Norad's Section for Research, Innovation and Higher Education, the Evaluation Department will make provisions for the dissemination of relevant evaluation and research-based knowledge in selected areas, in connection with the planning and development of thematic priorities in development policy.
